Whether you're marking a special year, creating a family heirloom, or just enjoying the daily practice of crochet, temperature blankets are a perfect blend of beauty, routine, and personal storytelling.

What Is a Temperature Blanket?

A temperature blanket is a unique, year long crochet project where each day is represented by a stitch, row, or motif in a specific color tied to that day's temperature. Over the course of 12 months, your blanket becomes a vibrant reflection of the changing weather in a specific location, your hometown, a memorable year, or anywhere meaningful to you.

Each color is a temperature range. Each row is a day. The result is a stunning handmade story of the year.

How to Start Your Crochet Temperature Blanket Journey

Ready to begin?

Here's how to get started:

- Choose your location, can be past or present.
- Pick a meaningful year, current, birthday, anniversary, etc.
- Record daily high/low/average temps using my printable journal.
- Select a yarn color palette that reflects your temperature range.
- Pick your blanket or stitch pattern, it can be as simple and single crochet stitch rows, or perhaps C2C, or even stitch samplers or even granny squares, the choice is yours.
- Crochet daily or weekly, adding rows or motifs that match your chosen temperature chart.
- Finish with a border and weave in the end to complete your one of a kind masterpiece.

This printable journal is designed to help you plan, track, and complete your crochet temperature blanket throughout the year.

Use this journal to:

- Record daily temperatures

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QUICK STEPS : PLANNING YOUR TEMPERATURE BLANKET

1. Find Your Temperature Range

Start by finding the highest and lowest average daily temperatures for your area.

A great way to do this is by checking the previous year's weather data on your favorite weather website.

Make a note of the average temperatures for each month to help you plan your color range and blanket design.

2. Choose Your Yarn & Colors

Select yarn that is easy to find and restock if needed.

Your climate and chosen temperature range will determine how many colors and skeins you use.

You can:

- Use one color per temperature
- Change colors every 2–3° for larger temperature ranges
- Create a custom palette that suits your climate

3. Create Your Temperature Color Chart

Use your minimum and maximum temperatures to assign colors to each temperature range.

Warmer climates may use more warm shades, while colder climates may use more cool shades. The more colors you use, the more vibrant your blanket will look.

4. Track Your Yarn Usage

Keep notes of:

- Yarn brand & weight
- Color names & codes
- Number of skeins used

Tracking your yarn helps prevent running out and makes future projects easier to plan.

5. Crochet & Record Daily Temperatures

Crochet one row per day using the color that matches the day's temperature.

You can crochet daily or record temperatures and catch up later — use the journal in the way that works best for you.

This journal can be used alongside any crochet temperature blanket pattern and is perfect for beginners and experienced crocheters alike.

WHAT TYPE OF YARN IS BEST FOR A CROCHET BLANKET ?

Choosing the Best Yarn for a Crochet Blanket

Choose a yarn that is easy to find, budget-friendly, and available in a wide range of colors. Temperature blankets often use many shades, so it's helpful to pick a yarn you can easily restock if needed. Your climate and color choices will affect how much yarn you use for each temperature range.

Recommended Yarn Weights

Worsted Weight (4)

The most popular choice for crochet blankets. Warm, versatile, and works up quickly without being too heavy.

Aran Weight (4)

Slightly thicker than worsted weight, creating a warmer and denser blanket — perfect for cooler climates.

DK Weight (3)

Ideal for lightweight, softer blankets with beautiful drape. Great for warmer climates or year-round use.

Bulky Weight (5)

Creates thick, cozy blankets that work up fast. Best for warm winter blankets and larger stitches.

Super Bulky Weight (6)

Perfect for extra plush and chunky blankets. Works up very quickly, but can become heavy or oversized without a swatch.

Helpful Tips

- Always make a gauge or size swatch before starting your blanket.
- Check whether your pattern includes resizing instructions.
- If using a different yarn than recommended, your final blanket size may change.
- Pick yarn that suits your climate, comfort, and budget.

QUICK GUIDE : CHOOSING YOUR BLANKET SIZE

1. Decide which blanket size you would like to make.
2. Create a small gauge swatch using your chosen yarn and hook.
3. Measure your swatch and use the sizing chart to find your starting chain count.

Gauge Swatch

- Chain 12 stitches
- Work 6 rows of half double crochet (hdc) or double crochet (dc) - according to your pattern notes.
- Finish off and measure the width

Helpful Tips

- Example sizes are based on double knit yarn and a 3.5 mm crochet hook.
- Different yarn weights and hook sizes will change the final blanket size.
- Temperature blankets require all 365 / 366 rows, so larger hooks and thicker yarn may create a very large blanket.
- If using bulky yarn or a large hook, consider making two smaller blankets instead.

Example Starting Chains

- Twin Size + 2.5" / 6.3 cm swatch → Chain 290
- King Size + 3" / 7.6 cm swatch → Chain 398

Please note: Final blanket sizes may vary slightly depending on personal crochet tension.

COMMONLY USED BLANKET SIZES

- Twin - 63 x 95 (inches) / 160 x 240 cm
- Double - 80 x 90 (inches) / 200 x 230
- Queen - 90 x 100 (inches) / 225 x 255
- King - 108 x 100 (inches) / 275 x 255
- King XL - 108 x 110 (inches) / 275 x 280

Remember this is a temperature blanket, and requires the full 365/6 rows to be worked for the year. If you prefer a heavier and larger hook, you can still enjoy and make the blanket but then I would suggest rather opting for two separate blankets.

Please take note of the sizing chart and how to create a gauge swatch information below, this section will assist you in getting the right size blanket for your blanket size requirements.

TIPS & TRICKS HOW TO START YOUR CROCHET BLANKET

HOW TO MAKE A FOUNDATION ROW FOR A HALF DOUBLE CROCHET BLANKET

Traditional Method: Chain + First Row - the most common method.

- Make a slip knot on your hook.
- Chain the number of stitches required for the blanket size you want to make
- Chain 2, work 1 hdc into 3rd stitch from hook.
- Work 1 hdc into each chain stitch until the end of the row.

Ensure that you have the right amount of stitches required as required by the pattern.

Chainless Foundation Stitch Method

This method combines chaining and the first row of stitches at the same time, it creates a stretchier edge and is great for projects that need flexibility and flow.

- Chain 2. Yarn over, insert hook into first chain, yarn over, pull up a loop (3 loops on hook).
- Yarn over, pull through 1 loop (this creates your foundation chain).
- Yarn over again, pull through all 3 loops (completes the HDC).

For the next stitch:

Yarn over, insert hook into the chain you just made (bottom of the previous stitch), and repeat steps 3-4.

JOINING A NEW COLOR IN A ROW

- Stop before finishing the last stitch of the row.
- For HDC, you'll have 3 loops on your hook. Instead of completing the stitch with the old color, yarn over with the new color and pull through the loops to finish the stitch. This way, the next row starts already in the new color.
- Chain 1 (or whatever your pattern requires) to turn your work using the new color.
- Continue crocheting across the row with the new color.
- Leave 4-6 inches of both the old and new yarn ends so you can weave them in later.
- Always start your row on top of the tail from your previous row, meaning, if you finished your row, ended off your color, and your tail is left, when you turn your work, your joining stitch will be on the stitch with the ending tail, the ending tail will sit on your right when you are working towards your left.
- Finish off and weave in the ends with a yarn needle.

EASY EDGING / BORDER

- Add 1–3 rounds of single crochet (SC) evenly around the blanket to give it a neat border.
- You can use the same yarn or a contrasting color.

HOW TO FINISH OFF A ROW

- Place the hook under the slip knot, and hook the tail to form a small loop, insert the hook back into the formed loop, pull the tail through the small loop, and tighten the tail

ESTIMATE YARN USAGE FOR DIFFERENT BLANKET SIZES

Estimate yarn usage for different blanket sizes

- Twin (65" x 90") - Approx. Yardage : 2500 – 3200 yards
- Full/Queen (90" x 90") - Approx. Yardage : 3500 – 4200 yards
- King (108" x 100") - Approx. Yardage : 4500 – 5000+ yards

Determine yarn usage

Determine yarn usage for a half double crochet (HDC) blanket, the most accurate method is to make a swatch and use it to estimate the total yarn needed. Here's how you can do it step by step.

Step 1: Make a Swatch

- Use the same yarn and hook size as you plan for your blanket.
- Make a square swatch — about 4" x 4" or larger.
- Count how many yards (or meters) of yarn it takes to make that swatch.
- Tip: Use a kitchen scale to weigh your swatch. Then calculate yarn usage like this

Step 2: Calculate Yarn Usage per Inch

Example: Your 4" x 4" swatch weighs 10 grams; your yarn label says 1 skein = 100g = 200 yards

So: $10g = (10 / 100) \times 200 \text{ yards} = 20 \text{ yards used for } 4" \times 4"$

Now: Area of swatch = 16 square inches / Yarn used per square inch = $20 / 16 = 1.25 \text{ yards/in}^2$

Step 3: Calculate Total Yarn for Blanket

Say your blanket is 50" x 60" = 3,000 square inches

Then: $3,000 \times 1.25 \text{ yards} = 3,750 \text{ yards needed.}$

Temperature Blanket Pattern Notes

Half double crochet stitches strike the perfect balance between the height of a double crochet and the tightness of a single crochet. They're ideal for creating soft, warm, and cozy textures, perfect for blankets of all kinds. Whether you're going for a classic look or a modern design, there's so much you can do with just a few variations of the HDC stitch.

MATERIALS

- Yarn
- Crochet hook
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Stitch markers

Yarn : See yarn section above.

Crochet hook

- Select a crochet hook which is recommended by the yarn label of your selected yarn, if you would like to have a softer and more stretchy finished fabric select a yarn hook which is one size larger than what is specified on the yarn label. Once you select a crochet hook, make a note on your pattern, or notepad , so you don't forget what crochet hook you use. If you change crochet hook sizes mid pattern your tension and gauge will not match the rows already worked.
- Once you have decided on your yarn and yarn weight and have the correct crochet hook, it is best to make a size swatch. The size swatch will then give you the amount of stitches you will need to create the blanket size you require.

STITCH INFORMATION

Stitches and abbreviations used in this pattern.

Pattern written in US terminology / stitch diagram symbols to the left.

Abbreviations

Below is the full list of stitches used in pattern instructions and stitch diagrams.

- BLO = back loop only - 1 hdc stitch into the back loop of required stitch
- Bet = between - work stitch in space between two crochet stitches or crochet stitch shells or clusters crochet stitch, not in stitch
- nxt = next - work into the next available required stitch as indicated in pattern
- ch = chain
- ch2 = chain 2 - make 2 chain stitches
- ch3 = chain 3 - make 3 chain stitches
- ch-sp = chain space - space left from any amount of chains worked between stitches
- hdc = half double crochet
- sc = single crochet
- sk = skip - skip stitch
- sk2 = skip 2 stitches
- st = single stitch
- st(s) = multiple stitches
- sp = space - space between two crochet stitches
- sp after / sp before = space before /after crochet stitch, not in stitch
- 3hdc-cl = 3hdc cluster - 3 hdc cluster into the same stitch or space
- 2hdc = 2 x hdc sts - 2hdc sts into the same stitch or space
- 3hdc = 3 x hdc sts - 3 hdc sts into the same stitch or space
- YO = yarn over

Stitch Pattern Repeats

When making a crochet blanket, "repetitions" (or "repeats") refer to the number of times you repeat a row, stitch pattern, or color sequence to build the size and design of your blanket. If your pattern uses a stitch sequence, you repeat that across the row.

Example: If the pattern is: *[HDC in next 2 sts, skip 1 st, HDC in next]* — that's a 3-stitch repeat.

You'll repeat that sequence across the whole row until it ends. The pattern will say something like *"Repeat across the row"* or *"Repeat from * to "*.

Row Repeats

You'll often repeat rows to grow the blanket, you simply repeat the rows as indicated in the pattern.

Example: If the pattern is: *Repeat Rows 1 to 3, Four times*,

You'll work Rows 1 to 3, first and then repeat rows 1 to 3 again 3 more times. Below is a quick step by step tutorial for crochet stitches used in the pattern.

STEP BY STEP STITCH INSTRUCTIONS

HDC - Half double crochet stitch

The HDC (half double crochet) stitch is a basic crochet stitch that's taller than a single crochet but shorter than a double crochet. Here's how you do it:

1. Yarn over (YO) – Wrap the yarn over your hook once.
2. Insert the hook into the stitch (or space) where you want to place your HDC.
3. Yarn over again, and pull through – You should now have 3 loops on your hook.
4. Yarn over one more time, and pull through all 3 loops on the hook.

SC - Single crochet stitch

1. Insert your hook, skip the first chain from the hook. Insert your hook into the second chain.
2. Yarn over (yo), wrap the yarn over your hook from back to front, pull through.
3. Pull the yarn back through the chain. You now have 2 loops on your hook.
4. Yarn over again, wrap the yarn over your hook one more time.
5. Pull through both loops. pull the yarn through both loops on the hook.

2HDC - 2 Half double crochet stitch

The 2HDC (2 half double crochet) stitch, you simply work 2hdc stitches into the same space.

3HDC - 3 Half double crochet stitch

The 3HDC (3 half double crochet) stitch, you simply work 3 hdc stitches into the same space.

3HDC-cl - 3 Half double crochet cluster stitch

This is worked into a single stitch or space and not across 3 separate stitches.

1. Yarn over (yo), insert hook into the stitch or space, yo, pull up a loop (3 loops on hook).
2. Yo, insert hook into the same stitch again, yo, pull up a loop (5 loops on hook).
3. Yo, insert hook into the same stitch a third time, yo, pull up a loop (7 loops on hook).
4. Yo, pull through all 7 loops on the hook. Yo, pull yarn the loop to secure the cluster.

BLO - Back Loop Only / FLO - Front Loop Only

Working in the back loop only means you insert your hook under just the back loop, not both. Working in the front loop only means you insert your hook under just the front loop, not both.

Each stitch on the row has two loops on top:

- Front Loop (FLO) – the one closest to you
- Back Loop (BLO) – the one farthest from you

STEP BY STEP STITCH INSTRUCTIONS

Back loop only stitch

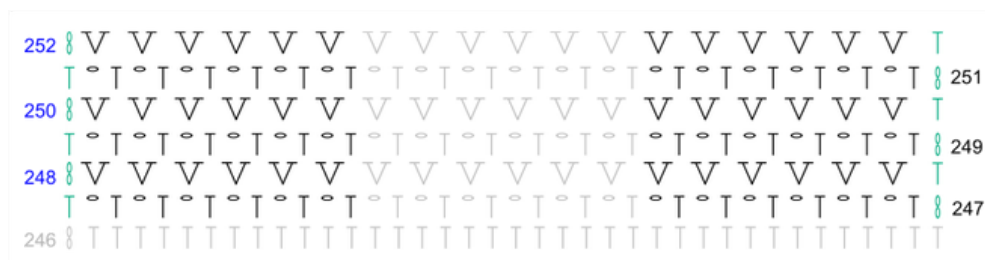
1. Yarn over (yo)
2. Insert your hook under the back loop only of the next stitch
3. Yo, pull up a loop (3 loops on hook)
4. Yo, pull through all 3 loops

Front loop only stitch :

1. Yarn over (yo)
2. Insert your hook under the front loop only of the next stitch
3. Yo, pull up a loop (3 loops on hook)
4. Yo, pull through all 3 loops

STITCH DIAGRAMS

Each crochet stitch pattern has its own stitch diagram alongside written instructions.



Above stitch diagram is an example of one of the stitch patterns,
Below is the written instructions in italic below so you can easily follow along.

*Row 1 : ch2, * 1hdc in hdc, ch1, skip next hdc st, repeat from * until the end of the row.,1hdc in the last stitch of the row.*

Row 2

*ch2, * 2hdc in 1 ch-sp, skip next hdc st, repeat from * until the end of the row.,1hdc in the last stitch of the row.*

- Stitch diagrams are read from left to right starting in the bottom right hand side corner,
- The bottom light grey row indicates the foundation row stitches, and does not form part of the pattern repeat.
- The green ch2 symbol shows the ch2 stitch in the written instructions,
- The pattern then repeats within the ch2 st, and the last green 1hdc st,
- The last hdc stitch ensures that your blanket stays straight.
- Note for every stitch pattern you will turn your after each row.

Below are the symbols, abbreviation and description for all stitch diagrams.

Each pattern can be customized by changing yarn weights, hook sizes, and color palettes, so feel free to get creative! Use these stitch patterns for full-size blankets, baby blankets, throws, or even just to practice and build your crochet stitch library.

QUICK RESIZING GUIDE

Quick Resizing Guide (Easy HDC Temperature Blanket)

This simple half double crochet (hdc) stitch pattern can be easily adjusted to fit any blanket size.

How It Works

- Your starting chain determines the width
- Each row builds the length
- You will complete 365/366 rows total (one per day of the year)

Step 1 – Make a Gauge Swatch

- Chain 12 stitches
- Work 6 rows of hdc (1 hdc in each stitch)
- Finish and measure the width

Step 2 – Choose Your Size

Use your swatch to match your desired blanket size:

- Smaller swatch width = more chains needed
- Larger swatch width = fewer chains needed

Step 3 – Adjust Starting Chain

Use your swatch measurement to calculate:

- Narrow swatch → increase starting chains
- Wide swatch → decrease starting chains

Example Starting Chains (Guide Only)

- Small / Throw → ~180–250 chains
- Twin → ~250–320 chains
- Queen → ~320–380 chains
- King → ~380–430+ chains

Important Notes

- This pattern is worked in straight rows (no turning variations needed)
- Tension will affect final size
- Always test with a swatch before starting your full blanket

QUICK FOUNDATION ROW

This foundation row sets up your blanket for all 365/366 temperature rows using simple half double crochet stitches.

Foundation Row

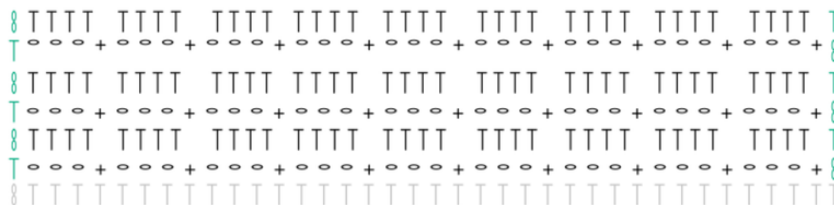
- Chain your starting chain (based on your gauge swatch and sizing chart)
- Row 1: Work 1 hdc into each chain across*
- Chain 2, turn

That's it ✓

You are now ready to begin your temperature rows:

- Each new row = 1 day of temperature
- Continue repeating the same hdc stitch pattern
- Change yarn color based on daily temperature

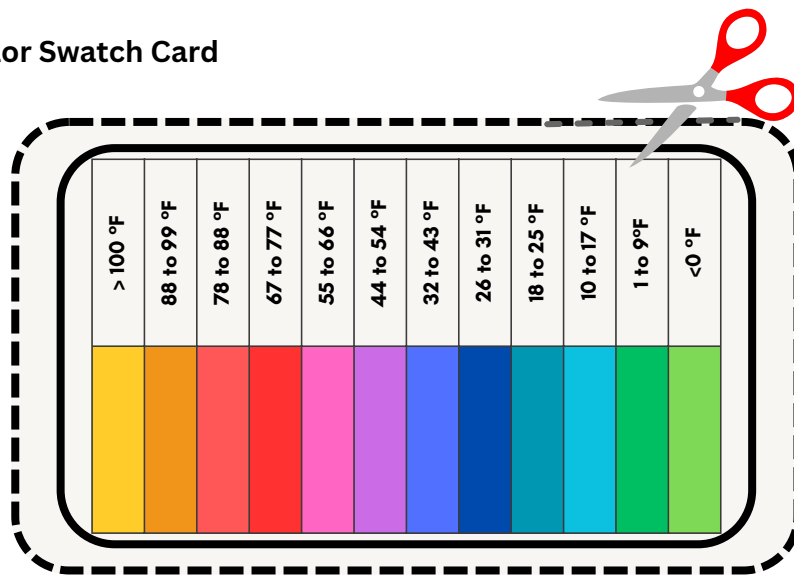

- Create your own easy template
- Cold weather climate Temperature Blanket Color swatch in Fahrenheit
- Warm weather climate Temperature Blanket Color swatch in Fahrenheit

Most people tend to want to use a temperature blanket with a range already decided for them, but sometimes the range of someone else is not always relevant to your climate, you might live in a very cold climate and won't even use some of the warmer colors, or you might be like me and live in a very warm climate and then not have any of the cooler colors featured in your blanket, so if you wish to create a blanket as uniquely to you and your climate you can.

How to Make Your Color Swatch Card



Print your swatch template and cut it out neatly.

Add a piece of cardboard behind it to make it strong and durable.

Secure it by:

- Laminating the swatch card, or
- Covering it with strong clear tape on both sides

For extra organisation:

- Punch small holes next to each color block
- Attach small yarn samples using slip knots
- Label each color if needed for quick reference

Tip

Keep your swatch card with your yarn so you can easily match colors throughout your temperature blanket project.

CREATE A CUSTOM TEMPERATURE COLOR SWATCH

Start with the overall min and max temperatures are for your area,
Select your colors, the color choice is completely up to you, if you wish to have a lot of color variations in your rows then use one color per temperature, if you live in a climate where there is a huge temperature shift and have a large temperature range then perhaps consider changing colors every 2 to 3° degrees.

The custom key template gives you up to 16 colors, you can choose less or more, your choice.

Options :

- One color for every 1°C
- One color for every 2 - 3, even 5 °C.
